THE AUSTERITY AGENDA IS WRONG!

AN "AUSTERITY AGENDA" is now being imposed on working people in most parts of the world, including Canada. When Stephen Harper invited the G20 leaders here in 2010, he won their agreement to embrace austerity measures instead of taking action against the greed of banks and speculators. Now austerity is being rolled out as if there is no other alternative, and includes:

Lay-offs
Cut-backs
Outsourcing
Freezing wages
Reducing benefits
Selling public assets
Unprecedented attacks on
collective bargaining

Governments at every level are playing the austerity card. Yet the people being targeted had nothing to do with creating the financial meltdown of global capital. And they had very little to do with causing budget deficits. Workers who find themselves on the wrong end of this assault are part of the 99 percent trying to make ends meet, just like all the rest of us. For the I percent, the reward is new opportunities to take over public services or assets, while continuing to reduce the cost of labour.

It doesn't matter if you have university or a grade 10 education, suddenly what you do for a living is deemed to be worth less. In fact the real decision-makers - CEO's and their political allies - are telling the entire next generation of Canadians that they are of less value than their parents.

Wrong - and Unfair

Thinking we can cut our way back to prosperity is simply wrong. Everywhere that harsh cuts have been applied the results are a worse economy and higher unemployment. Opportunities for young people to find decent work evaporate. In contrast, countries that have rejected austerity programs have better outcomes with more stable jobs. Governments need to invest in our economy and its foundation of strong public services.

Decent Jobs, Tax Justice

Deficits are a direct result of the intentional shrinking of public revenues through tax cuts. The worst example is the reduction of corporate tax rates which are costing the federal treasury \$14 billion each year, far exceeding the amount to be saved by painful budget cuts. For Ontario, the number is \$2 billion. Even companies that ship jobs overseas get the lower tax rates. Subsidies to the oil industry cost billions more, while distorting our dollar and undermining Ontario's manufacturing base. If we had tax justice in this country, politicians would have no cover for their regressive austerity program.

It's time to stop pandering to the I per cent, and rebuild our public revenues. It's time to stand with anyone whose job is being threatened, or whose quality of life is under attack. No matter what our place of work or occupation, we need to take a stand against austerity - together!

For a Better Life for All - FIX LABOUR LAW NOW

Everywhere you look, inequality is growing in greater Toronto and across Ontario. Workers who once believed that they had a secure future are either suffering setbacks or see them looming. Young people can't find stable jobs. As the percentage of good jobs falls, there is more pressure on unionized workers to give concessions, while aggressive employer tactics become the norm.

How can we change direction and stop the race to the bottom? It will only happen by restoring balance in our economy, and ensuring workers have the collective strength to win justice and dignity in the workplace. That means more people joining unions, because strong unions are an essential building block for a fair economy. The Ontario government urgently needs to fix labour laws to make that possible.

Workers need government on their side

Intimidation and reprisal are the most potent weapons used by companies to deny their employees the right to join a union. Everyone should have the right to join a union without fear. The proposals at Queen's Park in Bills 77 and 79 would help even up the odds when workers are trying to improve their lives through unionization. Bill 77 would also restore the rights that contract workers like cleaners, security guards and food service workers used to have to keep their union agreement and their seniority if the building contract changed hands. And it includes homecare providers whose lives are now dominated by a ruthless tendering system.

Rights and Dignity at Work

If Bills 77 and 79 are adopted, it would be a significant gain for hard-working women and men in this province. More needs to be done to counter the immense power of corporations who are driving incomes into either stagnation or a downward spiral. Today, there are people working in **manufacturing plants earning \$11** an **hour**, trying to raise a family above poverty while generating huge profits for multinational enterprise.

The prosperity of this society will never be shared fairly without a substantial shift in power dynamics. Workers need a fair deal, a chance to raise standards once again, and most of all – they need governments to be on their side in the years to come.

Please contact your Member of Provincial Parliament and ask them to fix the laws now!

Ask them to support Bills 77 and 79.

The Harper government has set about making this a country that caters to the fortunes of big business instead of caring about its ordinary citizens. The sweeping changes to Old Age Security are just the start of driving up the retirement age. The Conservative majority is ramming its agenda through Parliament with a vengeance. Corporate tax cuts trump healthcare. Workers of private companies like CP Rail and Air Canada are being stripped of their right to negotiate settlements. Environmental protections are struck down at will. And new trade deals threaten the right of cities and provinces to buy Canadian-made goods.

Retirees helped build this country into one of the greatest in the world. Now you have a special role to play to defend all that is good about Canada. Speak out, and help to spread the word:

ocal 353 has had great success in expanding work opportunities for its members through a unique "market recovery program" that supports a comprehensive organizing approach to our industry.

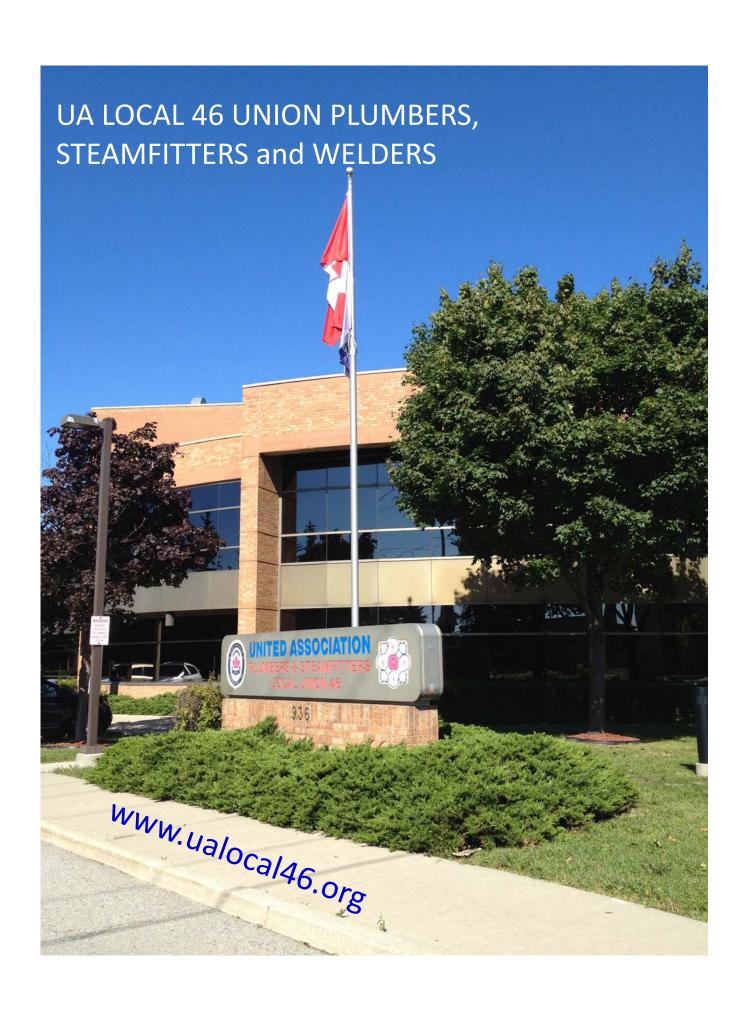

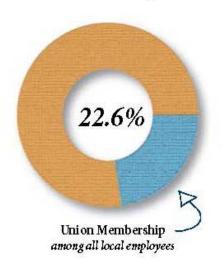

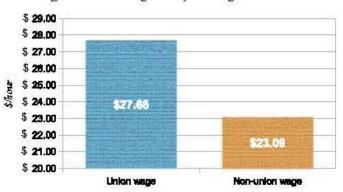
The Union Advantage in Toronto

There were 555,700 union members working in and around Toronto in 2011. That's 22.6% of all employees. Their weekly payroll of \$549 million accounted for 26% of the total payroll for the whole community.

On average, unionized workers earned \$4.59/hour more than non-union employees. That union advantage translated into over \$91 million more every week paid into the local economy to support local businesses and community services.
